

Meet the New Miss Universe—She’s an HIV Advocate!

“HIV/AIDS is a very big problem in my country, South Africa,” says Demi-Leigh Nel-Peters.

Demi-Leigh Nel-Peters, of South Africa, was crowned Miss Universe 2017 in Las Vegas, reports The Associated Press. Shortly afterward, the 22-year-old said she hopes to use her reign to draw attention to HIV/AIDS issues.

“HIV/AIDS is a very big problem in my country, South Africa, so I hope to stand as an advocate for that,” she told reporters.
